TIRED OF TIRES BY TERRI FOLKS

I've had two blow outs in the last two months. First, my truck had a blow out coming home from the OETRA Robbers Cave Ride on my truck. I had a terrible shimmy and couldn't figure out the issue. I exited off of I-40 at the Grand Casino, drove back roads to get home to north Edmond. I made it to 122nd street and it sounded like a gun shooting off. KAPOW! I limped into the Flying J. Called hubby to let him know what had happened.

Since it was a Sunday, I called AAA instead of US Rider hoping to get fast service. Hubby came to wait with me which I really appreciated! Unfortunately, the "Lego" blocks we use to put under the trailer jacks got left at home. With the flat on the truck, we had to take the trailer off. Cinnamon, the world's best horse, quietly munched on her hay, never making a sound. Hubby had to go home to get the blocks so note to self: ALWAYS Pack those Legos!

After the short delay, the tire came off and the spare went on! My tires were six years old (I didn't realize they were that old), so I replaced four tires since the blow out was replaced.

Blow out #2 happened on my trailer as I was nearing the Checotah exit on I-40. I never felt it because it was on the left rear tire. Someone in a red truck got my attention to tell me I had a flat. I limped to the exit and made it to the Flying J. I found a tree to park under, opened the back trailer door for for ventilation for Cisco, my new horse, and called US Rider who told me a tow truck would be there in 30 minutes. Not one person at the gas station asked me if I needed help or anything like that. The guy showed up in the tow truck and realized he didn't have tools. I had purchased an impact driver in case of an emergency. He said that wasn't an impact driver! ????

He finally found an impact driver, we used my trailer aide (BUY ONE IF YOU DON'T HAVE ONE.) He had never seen one before. He got the tire off but the tread had wrapped behind the (Continued on page 5)

I have loved riding horses all of my life. I grew up in S. California, but even there I managed to find horses to ride. Actually, I rode neighbor horses, Shetlands and even donkeys. If it had 4 legs, I was riding it. Horse keeping is very, very expensive in S. California, so I had to be creative.

I am a Real Estate Broker by trade (35 years) and met my husband at a real estate conference in Cancun Mexico. He was born and raised in Norman. I visited him in Oklahoma and loved it - so many horses and so much open space! Soon we were planning a wedding, and I brought my horse with me from California. tire and...of course, he had no way to get it off. He told me a tire store was across the street that was open 24/7 and they could get that off for me. It had to be done before I could drive on home because he said it would damage my tire. I drive across the street and there is a small tire shop on the backside of the building and guess what? It was closed. I asked another guy if there was another tire store in town and he said, yes, just right down the street. I drive over there and yes, it is closed too. I looked up the way and saw a Walmart Tire center attached to a Walmart store.

I got back in the trailer and drove up to the tire center. At this point I am pretty desperate. I needed to get home. I had no water with me for the horse. It was hot. The tire center workers tell me don't do that kind of work. I pleaded, I just need to get home. After some discussion, they told me I would have to take the horse out of the trailer after I moved it to the alleyway. Cisco was excellent as I took him out and we stood in front of the tire center waiting. The technician got all he could off of it. Walmart did not charge me a PENNY. I gave the young tech a tip to thank him. He also stood behind the trailer in case Cisco didn't want to get back in. Fortunately, he jumped back in the trailer and I headed for home.

I am so flustered I take Highway 69 instead of I-40 and was almost to McAlester before I realized my mistake. So that was about 60 miles I didn't need to travel. Just as I am tooling down the (Continued on page 6)

road, my truck goes into limp mode and won't go faster than about 30 mph. I limped to the next exit at Henryetta. I pulled into a parking lot. Turn off the truck and let it sit for 10 minutes so it would reset.

I drove around Henryetta with no more issues. I got back on I-40 and did fine until it went into limp mode again. I got off. Turned it off and on to reset and finally made it home. The truck went into the shop and had a lot of issues—\$\$\$\$. But I have a great diesel mechanic shop and they said it was good to go.

Unfortunately, with the blow out, it messed up my trailer brakes. I had no trailer brakes to get the trailer into the shop to get the flat replaced and remove the rest of the tread. I drove to Discount Tires in Edmond – I've been buying all of my tires from them. The manager came out and looked at my tires and said these tires are OLD. I said only three years. They had to order me a replacement tire. I couldn't find my receipt and they emailed it to me for my records. I took the trailer home.

When I posted the flat tire on the OETRA Facebook page, my wonderful friends pointed out that I only had 10 ply tires on my LQ trailer. I was like NO way! I researched tires when I bought them. And ordered 14 ply tires for my trailer. Sure enough, they had put 10 ply tires on. The good news is – after reaching out to their Corporate Headquarters – they replaced all of my LQ trailer tires with 14 ply and I only had to pay for the insurance of \$65 per tire.

The moral to this story is be your own advocate. Check things out for yourself and don't trust anyone. When you are hauling by yourself which I usually do, make sure to have US Rider or Trail Guard – both are road-side assistance for horse people! I also purchased an impact driver. No, I can't (Continued on page 7)

Free Services for Owned Horses in Oklahoma

Do you have a horse who needs medical care, rehoming, or requires euthanasia?

We can help.

The ASPCA Equine Transition and Adoption Center (ETAC), is a new Oklahoma-based pilot program focused on helping vulnerable horses get the care they need, including new adoptive homes.

Horse owners in the state of Oklahoma in need of compassionate help can access free services for owned equines. A mobile team, including a local veterinary partner, assesses the horse(s) at the owner's request.

Based on that assessment and in partnership with the owner, ETAC offers one of the following options:

- Subsidized veterinary care when it's best for the horse to stay at home with the owner
- Compassionate euthanasia if needed to prevent suffering
- Safe relinquishment, including any necessary

medical care or training, before placement in a loving new home

If you're in Oklahoma, call (405) 423-1461 to learn more about the services offered.

If you're outside Oklahoma, please email us and we'll do our best to connect you to local supportive resources or transport your horse to a rehoming partner near you.

Since opening in the Oklahoma City area, more than 250 equines have been helped. In 2018, a similar ASPCA Regional Support Center in the Dallas area assisted nearly 60 equines.

change a tire due to my mangled arm, but someone else could if I was stuck by the side of the road.

Also, if you are hauling a long distance, get an additional spare for your trailer.


Truck tires are easy to replace but trailer tires might not be in stock.

Good luck and Happy Trails!



The last letter in a standard tire size indicates the number of layers used in the construction of the tire. If there is no letter, the tire has the standard 4 plies. A "C" indicates 6 plies, a "D" indicates 8 plies, and an "E" indicates 10 plies. The higher the number of plies in a tire, the stronger the tire is and the more air pressure the tire can safely hold. Higher ply tires require more air pressure to maintain proper wear.

Tire Age—Find the DOT on the tire. The number after that on mine it is 4621 – that means the tire was manufactured during the 46th week of 2021.





Equine Infectious Anemia

Yes, we get it, it's a pain to make sure your Coggins papers are up to date before heading out to a horse show, trail ride or other public equine gathering.

But there is a reason regulatory laws are in place and why officials must turn horse owners away if they are unable to produce a current negative Coggins. Equine infectious anemia has no cure nor a vaccine. As it is a retrovirus, EIA incorporates itself into the animal's genome, and mutates quickly, making it difficult to produce a successful vaccine. Thus, our only protection against its spread is testing and identifying positive horses.

So why bring it up? Equine infectious anemia has been found in Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas and multiple cases in Texas


While transmission via insect bites is assumed to be the most common, an alarming number have been spread via iatrogenic means. What does this fancy word mean? Essentially transmission through

"medicinal or treatment means". In other words, dirty equipment (needles, syringes, catheters) shared between horses. In short, needles and syringes should never be shared between horses. Even dental equipment should be cleaned/disinfected between horses.

While we can't keep all biting insects at bay, we can all do our part as horse owners.

- 1. Test routinely for Coggins. This means annually for horses traveling.
- 2. Check your paperwork for current testing dates before you leave the house! In a pinch, there are some veterinary clinics which offer quick response testing.
- 3. If you are a show/event manager, it is your job to check papers and turn horses away if necessary.
- 4. Do not share medical equipment between horses!


Liberty Lake News! By Julie Comeron

Murder at Cedar Lake: a Halloween Trail Ride Mystery

Setting: Cedar Lake Equestrian Campground, nestled in the rugged Quachita Mountains of Southeast Oklahoma, is a haven for horse enthusiasts. It's October 31, 2025, and the Oklahoma Equestrian Trail Riders (OETRA) club has gathered 80 members for their annual Halloween ride. The crisp autumn air carries the scent of pine and campfire smoke, and the campground buzzes with excitement—costumed riders, decorated horses, and spooky trail games under
